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Chairman's Message

When President Halford D. Wilson called the first Annual General Meeting of the British Columbia Aviation Council (BCAC) to order on September 16, 1938, he may not have envisioned the thriving and connected aviation and aerospace sector we have in B.C. today, but he would have been proud that BCAC was at its forefront.

The most recent Emerson Report on Aerospace estimates that the aerospace sector alone contributes \$2 billion to the B.C. economy. This does not account for the contributions of heli-logging, float planes, cargo distribution, 248 aerodromes, 6000 aircraft, over 30,000 pilots, and 5000 Aircraft Maintenance Engineers operating in B.C.

In 2013, BCAC focused on the future while celebrating our past. Teara Fraser (our Executive Director until June) helped lead the Board in developing a robust Strategic Plan which will guide the organization over the next five years. We held a successful celebration of BCAC's 75th Anniversary in September and had our largest attendance to date at our Annual Silver Wings Awards in October.

During the year, BCAC merged with the B.C. Airport Managers Association and Carman Hendry, CEO of Terrace-Northwest Regional Airport, heads up the Airports Committee, providing support to managers and aviation professionals. The bottom line of our endowment fund grew to \$230,000 thanks to a generous contribution of \$38,000 from the Airports Committee as well as contributions generated from BCAC events. The fund grew by 12.5% through successful investing led by Peter Kutney of the company Partners in Planning. As we look to future growth, this fund will allow sustainable contributions to our scholarship funds for years to come.

In August, a new part-time Executive Director was hired: Vanessa Griffiths. Vanessa, alongside long-standing Administrator, Donna Farquhar, has the task of growing the organization over the next several years as we pursue our Strategic Plan. We hope you take a moment to review our results for 2013 and we look forward to growing the aviation and aerospace sector in 2014.

On the heels of the release of a very strong and vibrant Strategic Plan that will take us into 2017, and a Vision of "An Aviation and Aerospace Community that is visible, connected and thriving" it has made our goals as a Council incredibly clear. BCAC has been working hard with

a talented and strong Board of Directors who have been engaged in their committees, workshops development, and in the community. This year we added committees for Membership, Air Operators, and Youth Engagement to meet the needs of a healthy and active community that represents our membership needs.

I have had the pleasure of meeting many of you and attending many conferences, which included ATAC's AGM, AIAC Aerospace Summit, Unmanned Systems, Aviation Leadership Forum and many others. One of our Strategic Priorities is "Connecting our Communities with a Strong Voice" so we are working even harder to create platforms where we can connect and learn from and with each other. This year, we held a workshop on Bridging the Skills Gap and heard concerns from the community that they are not finding the qualified staff they require anymore. The message was that a shift in thinking must happen to meet this growing need in the industry. By empowering the younger generation, and taking a risk we are seeing those that embrace this are thriving, and keeping up with a very fast moving and innovative time. BCAC has also teamed up with the Aviation Leadership Foundation to establish the first ever Mentorship Program. By partnering groups into triads they have been sharing and learning from each other. They are creating bonds that will last a life time. We will continue on with this program as it is imperative to give those that are interested the space to connect and learn from each other. As Co-Chair of the Youth Engagement Committee we are also looking to the future and how to get Youth involved and networking with each other and we will be hosting Youth featured events in the years to come.

The most talked about buzz in our province has been the growth of Aerospace and Unmanned Systems this year. Our potential is unlimited when we look at our positioning near Boeing, and Asia. Working towards creating hubs at Airports allows us to openly share information, and work together in our fast paced world that will give us a competitive edge over other countries. From opportunities in the Aerospace sector, the need of Airports to meet demands for growth, and working with industry in identifying ways to fill the demand for skilled trades, the winds of change are in our favour if we work together on solutions. With all BC has to offer, beautiful islands, lakes, and mountainous terrain, we as a province are reliant on air transportation for goods and travel with over 364,764 square miles of coverage to often-remote locations. We will be working hard to discover our socio and economic impact of Aviation and Aerospace in our Province because it has yet to be measured and will only provide more insight to the general public and other industries how dependent and important this industry is.

At the Silver Wings Awards, I was so proud to see the many students receiving scholarships and to know that their future is bright. We are happy to be delivering more scholarships, with two new ones added to the roster this year. One, the Anderson Family Scholarship, awards \$5,000 to a BC student aged 16-19 working towards their pilot's license. The second, the Mary Swain Memorial Scholarship is to be awarded to a BC female student who is working towards a private or commercial pilot's license, or aircraft maintenance engineer's license, or in an airport operations program. We will continue to grow the scholarship fund and look at ways to increase and manage planned giving for those looking to make a difference in a young aviators life and career path.

I look forward to continuing to serve and represent the BC Aviation Council and it's members.

In order to achieve the vision, continued organizational sustainability is considered with every BCAC decision, action, initiative, program, and event.


Objective: BCAC continues to strengthen and grow the organization's financial stability in order to realize the vision.
